Mini Longest Day Soldier – 4" high (10cm) designed specifically for The Longest Yarn Project By Jenny Shepperd

Mini Soldier – 4" (10cm)

Needles – 3.50mm & 2.75mm, (double pointed needles for icord legs, crochet hook for chin strap) DK Hayfield Bonus - Olive Green Oddments of dark brown and Black Stylecraft Special – Toy Stuffing e sticks or wire.

Pipe cleaners/chenille sticks or wire.

Tension Unimportant, just make sure work is tight so stuffing doesn't show through Body – 3.50mm needles Leg (Make 2) CO 3 Stitches in green yarn (Work as an icord) Row 1 – Inc K wise every stitch – 6 Stitches Row 2 - 11 – work 10 rounds in K Leave stitches on separate needle Work second leg in the same way as the first With right side facing, K across 6 stitches of second leg and then 6 stitches of first leg – 12 Stitches (Now working flat) Beginning with P row St-st 11 rows Break off yarn and join in flesh colour for head St-st 6 rows Next row - (K2 tog) to end- 6 stitches Break off yarn and leave long end and B & T Join body & head seam leaving top of head open, turn right side out. Put pipe cleaner down legs and bring out through bottom of legs to include the boots later. Stuff body and head. Pull up yarn tightly of head and fasten off, tie a strand round the neck and tighten

Jacket body – 3.50mm needles

CO 20 stitches in Green Knit 2 rows Next row – K1 Purl to last stitch K1 Next Row K Repeat last 2 rows 4 more times Next row – K1 Purl to last St K1 Next row K1 (K2 tog) to last 2 stitches K1 – 11 stitches **Collar – Change to 2.75mm needles** K1 (inc 1, K2) to last 2 Stitches inc 1, K1 (15 sts) P 1 row Cast off Sew onto body joining down the front. Turn down collar

Arms – make 2 – 3.50mm needles

Using flesh CO 2 stitches – work as i cord Row 1 – Increase knit wise into every stitch – 4 stitches Work 1 round Join green yarn Work 8 rounds Cast off Pass pipe cleaner through jacket and body to make the arms moveable, you can stuff the arms if you prefer Sew arms to each side of body with jacket on – lift collar and sew under this.

Belt – 3.50mm needles

In brown – Cast on 22 sts Cast off Sew around middle of jacket **Boots – make 2 – Size 3.50mm needles – (Black boots for British Soldiers)** Begin at top edge In black cast on 10 sts Next row – k4, inc in next 2sts, k4 (12sts) Next row – k4, inc in next 2sts, k4 (12sts) Next row – k4, (K2tog) 2 times, K 4 (10sts) Cast off Join row ends at cast off edges –sew onto bottom of the legs angling pipe cleaner as foot

Beret - Size 2.75mm needles

In Black - CO 18 stitches (tightly) Row 1 - Knit Row 2 – Purl Row 3 – K4 Inc K8 Inc K4 Row 4 – Purl Row 5 – K4 K2tog K8 K2tog K4 Row 6 – P2 P2tog to end Row 7 – K2tog to end Slip stitches and pull to finish Place beret on head and pull top over to side – secure in place Add emblem in gold thread
